

## An Attitude of Gratitude is Not Enough!

This month we, as a nation, celebrate Thanksgiving, and we'll hear much of the same old platitudes about being thankful for the blessings we have received. When I was younger, I always thought I was grateful because I appreciated all the blessings I had received. I enjoyed them, I felt good about them, I loved those who showed such kindness and tried to do well by them in return whenever possible. But then one day someone told me, "You really need to say 'Thank you' more often."

It was a bit devastating. I thought I had been sufficiently grateful because I felt grateful. I could easily point to something each day for which I could give thanks to God, even tribulations and troubles. I had an "attitude of gratitude." The problem was, I was lousy at communicating my gratitude in a clear and meaningful way. There's a reason we call it "Thanksgiving," not "Thanks-having." It's necessary to not only *feel* gratitude but to *express* gratitude.

There are many ways to express gratitude but the most sure and articulate way is to use the word "Thanks," in some form or another. It's nice also to show some small kindness in return. The practice of writing thank you notes was once common but seems increasingly rare in a society where communication is fast, informal, impersonal, and disposable/erasable. In such an easy-to-be-isolated setting, the gift of a thank you note or a personal phone call to verbally share thanks is more than just good manners—it is a sign of spiritual health. I've always appreciated such notes and have kept many of them throughout the years. They remind me when I'm feeling down or disconnected that I have done some good things in my life, there are people who care about me, and that I may just be worth something after all. Such concrete acts of thanksgiving can continue to give many times over.

Romans 10:10 says, "With the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." We should consider that principle when it comes to gratitude. The inner disposition of gratitude shows the right attitude of a good heart, but only when expressed with the mouth does such gratitude make a true difference and show grace and favor. Let's all make sure we are sensitive to others, overcoming the temptation of selfabsorption, and communicate our thanks on a daily basis. Try it—and see how happy you make those around you feel!

#### DOXACON- To Boldly Go Where No Conference Has Gone Before

The center of the fire looked like glowing metal, in the fire was what looked like four living creatures. In appearance their form was that of a man, but each of them had four faces and four wings."

-Ezekiel 1: 4-6

Vou have been hearing or seeing the word, ▲ "Doxacon", for the last several months, either through church announcements or this newsletter. What is it? What does it mean? Doxacon came about from a conversation that Father and I had following a podcast on Ancient Faith Radio about ... zombies. We found it underwhelming. We then listened to another podcast by John Granger on Harry Potter. We were impressed with the scope and quality of the lecture. Jokingly, we said there needs to be some kind of gathering where Orthodox fans of the science fiction and fantasy genres could discuss their mutual interests in the framework of Orthodox Christianity. I thought nothing of it until Father mentioned that Psa. Stephanie loved the idea and wanted to actually move ahead with this gathering. We quickly moved to define Doxacon. Why the name? "Doxa" is from ancient Greek δόξα from δοκεῖν dokein, "to expect", "to seem", which later was used in spiritual context as "belief" or "truth". The "con" is the shortened term for "convention". One of the first things that sprung to our minds was that of St. Basil speaking to young men on the right use of Greek literature. In his speech he said of all forms of non-Christian literature:

"Now, then, altogether after the manner of bees must we use these writings, for the bees do not visit all the flowers without discrimination, nor indeed do they seek to carry away entire those upon which they light, but rather, having taken so much as is adapted to their needs, they let the rest go. So we, if wise, shall take from heathen books whatever befits us and is allied to the truth, and shall pass over the rest."

The purpose of Doxacon is to discuss amongst Orthodox Christians which flowers we should visit and what pollen we should take from them. There is much in the genres of sci-fi and fantasy that is worthy of our attention. Many sci-fi/fantasy authors drew on ideas based on Christian themes, people, or events. In stories such as "Lord of the Rings", "Dune", "Star Wars" and "Star Trek", the fate of the world --or even the universe, hangs on the actions of individuals. These individuals must stand by their principals and beliefs to save everything. We get to learn what would we do in these situations that seem implausible now, but may one day become very real. We look back at George Orwell's "1984" and see the balancing act between freedom and security as one we live with every day now. Aldous Huxley's "Brave New World" of consumerism and hedonism doesn't seem so different in today's society, as it did when first published.

Doxacon is schedule for the weekend of July 19-21, 2013 in Springfield, VA. We plan to have keynote speakers who are authorities on the subject of Sci-Fi/Fantasy in the context of the Christian view and response. One of our keynote presenters will be Dr. Thomas Bertonneu of SUNY in Otego, NY who wrote the book "The Truth is Out There: Christian Faith and the Classics of Science Fiction Television". Following the Keynote address, we will host breakout sessions led by presenters Father and I will select from applicants who answered our "Call for Papers" for topics of discussion.

## Help Us "Love The World"

Love the World Fellowship is a nondenominational Christian church for homeless men, women, and children in the Northern Virginia area. Some sleep in tents in the woods. Some sleep on benches. Some sleep in doorways. The reasons they are homeless are as many as there are people. They are often hungry and cold.

Love the World seeks to help those on the fringes of our society. 50 Sundays out of the year, they meet in the basement of Truro Anglican Church to have a hot meal (all donated), sing hymns, listen to Scripture readings, to pray together, and to thank God for the many blessings He has provided through Love the World Fellowship. But winter brings special challenges for those who have no home.

James 2:16 tells us, "<sup>16</sup> and one of you says to them, "Depart in peace, be warmed and filled," but you do not give them the things which are needed for the body, what *does it* profit?"

Because they are homeless, they have no place to store winter items during the summer and need to replace winter clothing. Every year people from around the area donate items for a "shopping day" for these homeless people. Donated items are placed out on tables by size and each church member in turn is allowed to "shop" for items they need. The next shopping day will be 4 December.

If you would like to donate even just one item, I will take them to be sorted and distributed. Please bring items to church no later than 18 November. A list of items is in the next column: The sizes needed are Men's Large to 3X and Women's Medium to 2X.

Ovidiu and Dorina Maxim would like to raise donations for a Romanian soldier, Florinel Eneache, who was wounded in Afghanistan. Mr. Eneache lost both of his legs and one of his arms. He is currently a patient in Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda Maryland. He has been in the hospital since May. His family (wife and son ) still live in Romania and could only afford to visit him one time. The Romanian Government is unable to support them. Mr Enache needs a special wheelchair that costs \$25,000 and he has to pay half of the cost. He receives only \$200 per month for disability. He cannot benefit the use of artificial legs because of the very high amputation, with no support for prosthesis. If it is possible in any way for the generosity of hearts to help this man, please consider giving a donation during coffee hour.
